ASIA NEAR AND FAR. CONNOISSEURS, COLLECTORS AND DEALERS OF ASIAN ART IN FRANCE (1750-1930)

The Dijon Museum of Fine Arts presents Asia near and far. Connoisseurs, collectors and dealers of Asian art in France (1750-1930), an exhibition recognised as being of national interest by the French Ministry of Culture.

In partnership with the French National Institute for Art History (INHA), this new and ambitious project offers the public a chance to discover two centuries of enthusiasm for Asian art in France, from the royal collections of Louis XV and Marie-Antoinette to the commercial and scientific collecting done in Asia from the 1850s to the 1930s – not to mention the craze for Japonism shared by artists, collectors and simple enthusiasts of 'knickknack hunting' in the 19th century.

As an extension of the INHA's vast research programme of the same name, the exhibition will bring together national collections from France and Far Eastern regional holdings, in a scenography that is both contemporary and evocative of the imaginations that have crystallised around the many objects brought from Asia over the ages.

Featuring more than 300 works of great technical diversity (lacquers, porcelains, ivories, bronzes, screens, prints and illustrated books, silk paintings, and theatre masks), historical and geographical diversity (China, Japan, Korea, and Cambodia), the exhibition is supported by prestigious loans from numerous French national institutions: Musée Guimet, Musée du Louvre, Château de Versailles, Musée des Arts décoratifs, Musée du Quai Branly, etc.

Regional Asian collections are also well represented (Florine Langweil in Colmar and Strasbourg, Jules Adeline in Rouen and Adhémard Leclère in Alençon), especially with the Dijon Museum of Fine Arts benefiting from the museum's restoration work completed ahead of the exhibition.

The large-scale restoration of a Coromandel lacquer screen, a masterpiece from "Chinese collection" of the 18th-century Dijon parliamentarian Jehannin de Chamblanc, was the subject of a call for donations, representing 15% of the total restoration budget. Thanks to this campaign and to the donors, almost 10,000 euros were raised to complete the restoration of this exceptional work, which will be on display at the exhibition.

This exhibition is organised by the City of Dijon, in partnership with the Institut national d'histoire de l'art (INHA). It is part of the framework partnership agreement between the museums of the city of Dijon and the Louvre Museum. This exhibition is recognised as being of national interest by the French government (Ministry of Culture/Prefect of the Bourgogne-Franche-Comté region), which is providing exceptional financial support.
